Probation Services

The purpose of Probation is to hold children accountable for their delinquent acts based on the needs of the child and the risk to the community. Probation is often a catalyst for change and personal development for children. Services and supervision provided by Probation are tailored to the child and their situation. Probation services are also designed to prevent children from becoming more deeply involved in the juvenile justice system.

We want to help children understand why their behavior brought them to the court and give them the skills they need to be happy, law abiding, successful citizens.

We work with all children referred for delinquent offenses:

- Ages 8 to 17.
- A case plan or contract is developed by the child, parent and Probation Officer during the interview.
- Child's risk and needs are addressed by the case plan or contract.
- More than 2/3rds of delinquent referrals are diverted from the formal court processes.

Services and Programs:

- **Diversion:** a program where formal court action is averted and informal means are used to resolve a juvenile case. Informal process programs are usually used for first and second offenses which are minor acts of delinquency.
- **Standard Probation:** A program for the supervision of children placed on probation to the court. These children are under the care and control of the court and are supervised by field probation officers.



The Probation Division offers numerous programs and services that will help children change their behavior, restore their victim, and build skills while completing their contract or court orders. These are some of the programs offered:

- **Community Renewal and Enrichment Through Work-Children** participate in community service projects.

- **Counseling** – Individual, group and family available.
- **Community Support Program** – Evening reporting program for children struggling on probation.
- **Domestic Violence Alternative Center** – An alternative to detention option for children referred for domestic violence.
- **Education Consultants** – Helps make sure children are placed in the right schools and programs.
- **Electronic Monitoring** – A release option for detained children
- **Employment Readiness Program** – Helps children determine a career path and obtain skills they can use to get a job
- **Employee Internship Program** – Children gain work experience as employees at the juvenile court.
- **Make a Change Program** – Treatment readiness for detained children with substance abuse issues.
- **Restitution Accountability Program** – Allows unemployable children to earn money to repay victims.
- **Youth Recovery Court** – Treatment based program for children on probation who abuse drugs and alcohol.
