Services Available on Juvenile Justice Side

- Available treatment services for youth on probation, but none to address specifically Domestic Violence. General mental health counseling, family counseling offered through these services. Psychological evaluations obtained for determining out of home placement.
- Depending on referrals, youth enter into diversion and are evaluated by a MS level therapist.
- A DV curriculum is in place for boys and girls and have recently started one for parents to go to be educated.
- Shelters available on short term for youth in community.
- Emerge! Work with DV victims but are restricted with working with delinquent youth because of type of grant they have.
- As of yet, no services are available for Dad's with children in Tucson.
- Need to find therapist resources to work with youth who need help but not necessary need to be out of their home and continue this help when probation case is closed.
- Pima County needs a specialized quality in-home therapy for youth and family unit. Funds an issue. Maricopa County has this.
- No accountability with parent(s) and youth are not always provided with needed services.
- What is best practice? Any on-line services available?

Services available on Dependency Side

- CPS removes child from home and notifies CPSA
- CPSA notifies SAMHC with CSP selected
- SAMHC completes Assessment and sends this to CSP for child age 5 to 18. For birth to four, Easter Seals Blake Foundation does this assessment.
- Whatever services child needs are determined and put in place.
- Accountability with parent(s) if not compliant.

CSP – Community Service Provider or Networks (La Frontera, Pantano, Providence, Casa de los Ninos, Blake Foundation, Marana Health Center, Pantano subcontracts with Intermountain and Arizona's Children)

SAMHC – Southern Arizona Mental Health Corporation
